Important Terms

OFFICE FOR FAMILY INDEPENDENCE (OFI)

This is the DHHS agency that determines if someone is eligible for MaineCare, including Katie Beckett.

OFFICE OF MAINECARE SERVICES (OMS)

This is the DHHS agency that pays providers for the services they provide to MaineCare members. OMS facilitates the medical assessment process with KEPRO and collaborates with OFI regarding medical eligibility. OMS also tracks the financial charges to ensure the member does not exceed the annual maximum amount that MaineCare will pay each year based on the level of care needed.

Important Terms

KEPRO

This agency has a contract with DHHS to complete the medical assessment to determine if the child meets the standards for institutional level of care.



MEDICAL REVIEW TEAM (MRT)

This team is responsible for reviewing an individual's medical documents to determine if they meet the Social Security Administration's disability standards. DHHS has a contract with the University of Massachusetts (UMass) to conduct this review.



What is the Katie Beckett Waiver Program?

A WAY FOR CHILDREN TO ACCESS
MAINECARE BENEFITS AND QUALIFY
BASED ON DISABILITY OR SPECIAL
HEALTH CARE NEEDS.

MAINECARE BENEFITS INCLUDE:

- Insurance coverage for doctors' visits, hospitalizations & medications
- Access to therapies (i.e., PT, OT, Speech)
- Fulfilling the prerequisites for accessing support programs such as Section 28 Rehabilitative & Community Support Services

Who is eligible to receive benefits through the Katie Beckett Waiver Program?

Child is under the age of 19

Child must live at home but requires a level of care provided by a hospital, nursing home, group home, or psychiatric hospital OR child lives in one of these facilities but is being discharged and continues to require the same level of care


Child must have a physical or mental disability that will last at least twelve months

Child (not family)
does not have
resources greater
than \$2,000 and has
a monthly income
less than 300% of
the Supplemental
Security Income
(SSI)

Child cannot do what other children of a similar age can do

Costs at home must not exceed the costs MaineCare would pay if the child were in an institution Child does meet the criteria to be considered disabled by the Social Security Administration

Child does not qualify for MaineCare under any other category (i.e., family income)



You must first apply for MaineCare to see if your child qualifies based on the family's income rather than the child's disability.

This is referred to as Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI-related) Coverage.

• If your child qualifies based on income, then full MaineCare benefits are awarded.

Who can complete the application?

The application should be filled out by you or an adult member of your household, or a relative, friend or authorized representative who knows the financial situation of all household members. If you would like to appoint an authorized representative to act on behalf of the household, you may do so by filling out an Appointment of Representative form.

What other information may I need?

You may need to give us proof of much of the information you list on your application. You can find a list of things you may need to provide as proof on the back of this page. If you are applying for MaineCare because you are disabled, you may need to complete a disability determination form. Forms are available online at http://www.maine.gov/dhhs/ofi/public-assistance/.

MaineCare Programs MaineCare

Helps people with medical bills such as bills for doctors, hospitals, and medicines.

State Supplement

Provides cash payment to aged, blind, or disabled people who get SSI, or would be eligible for SSI except for income or due to citizenship rules.

Medicare Savings Program (Buy-In)

Helps pay Medicare deductibles, co-pays, co-insurance or premiums for low-income

Cub Care (CHIP)

Children's Health Insurance Program is a premium based coverage for children 18

Katie Beckett

Program provides at home care services for children 18 and under who are determined to have a high medical need.

Family Planning Services

Helps with services, such as: Family Planning, Reproductive and Sexual Health Care or Sexually Transmitted Infections.

Low Cost Drugs (DEL)

Helps with the cost of prescription medications for the elderly.

Maine RY

Prescription assistance program to help with the cost of prescription medication.

Special Benefits Waiver

Provides certain services to people with

Breast/Cervical Cancer

Covers clinical breast exams, pelvic exams, pap tests, and high-risk HPV testing.

Filling out the application is extensive & requires many official documents. These may include:

Pay careful attention when filling out the application to ensure it will be processed correctly. Our **Family Support Navigators** can assist you in this process.

Be sure to state that your child has a disability on the MaineCare application.

This should signal the eligibility specialist to screen for the Katie Beckett Waiver.

You will receive a MaineCare denial letter if your child does not qualify based on MAGI-related coverage (financially).

This does not automatically mean your child is ineligible for Katie Beckett.

Reminder: In order to be found eligible for benefits, OFI will determine if your child meets the financial rule as well as the medical rules.

FINANCIAL RULE:

Child does not have resources greater than \$2,000 and has a monthly income less than 300% of the Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

MEDICAL RULES:



Every year, a financial review is required to make certain your child does not qualify for MaineCare based on other federal programs.

Following up with OFI is extremely important. If you have questions about the status of your child's application or about a denial you have received, you should reach out to OFI directly.

This packet should be completed and submitted at the same time you submit the MaineCare application.

Do not wait to receive a determination about the eligibility for MaineCare based on income before completing the Disability Determination packet.

THESE FORMS WILL REQUIRE THE APPLICANT TO PROVIDE:

Information about the nature of the disability Extensive health history

Education & work history

Evaluation of Activities of Daily Living (ADLs)

> Evaluation forms are included in the packet and intended to be filled out by the parent or guardian.


Parents should attach a letter or make a note on the packet under the section "Additional Information" to indicate they are applying for the Katie Beckett Waiver Program.

There is no option on the form to indicate you are applying for Katie Beckett, <u>so you</u> <u>must include your</u> <u>own statement</u>. Note: If a family did not qualify for MaineCare under the financial qualifications, OFI should automatically screen your child's application for Katie Beckett eligibility. However, it is recommended to "flag" your application as stated above, to ensure that it moves through the proper process.

The Disability

The purpose of the **Release of Medical Records** is to provide **OFI** with the information needed to make their disability determination.


Steps 1 and 2

After you have completed steps 1 and 2 of the application process, the Medical Review Team (MRT) will assess the information and determine if your child meets the disability criteria.

The MRT will work with your child's providers to compile necessary medical documents.

It is important to fill out all of the medical release forms when completing the Disability Determination packet, as the MRT will rely on those releases when accessing your child's records.

You should give your child's providers advanced notice that you are applying for Katie Beckett as they will only have 30 days to submit their documents during the medical review.

A registered nurse who works for KEPRO will perform an in-person appointment to assess your child's "Level of Medical Care."

The assessment is usually done at the local Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) office, and your child must attend with you.



The MRT will share the medical information they had previously collected with KEPRO.

KEPRO may still request additional information from you or your child's providers in order to complete their level of care medical assessment.

*If you have questions at this point in the application process, all communication should be direct with KEPRO.

The KEPRO assessment is very comprehensive and requires the following documents for all children:


- List of current medications
- List of current diagnoses from a physician
- Most recent medical evaluation by a physician
- If your child receives specialized services and has an Individualized Education Program, Individual Treatment Plan, Individual Family Service Plan, Individual Service Plan, or any other type of treatment plans you must submit the most recent plans, including progress notes and/or 90-day reviews.

In addition to the clinical documentation which all children must submit, KEPRO requires specific documentation based on a child's diagnosis. For example:

The KEPRO assessment is very comprehensive and requires the following documents for all children:

- Most recent psychiatric evaluation
- Most recent social evaluation
- Progress reports from therapists (i.e., Speech, OT, PT)
- Nursing plan, if child requires nursing services

Step 4: Notice of Decision




Step 4: Notice of Decision

Once all the reviews are completed, OFI will mail a Notice of Decision to you stating whether your child has been granted MaineCare coverage or if they have been denied coverage. If MaineCare coverage is approved, you will receive additional mailings with information about premiums as well as an official MaineCare identification card.

If your child has been denied coverage, and you believe this decision was made in error, you may contact OFI to appeal this decision. The denial letter will state the reasons for which your child has been denied coverage.

Step 5: Katie Beckett Premiums



Premiums begin when coverage starts and are billed every 3 months.



You can pay your premium monthly or 3 months at a time.


*If you pay monthly, payments are due the first of each month.

*If you pay 3 months' worth of premiums at one time, payments are due by the 15th of the 3rd month.



Premiums are determined based on the family's income and size.

Step 6: Annual Review



There are up to 3 parts in an annual review:

1. Every year, a financial review is required to make certain your child does not qualify for MaineCare based on federal rules.

Your monthly premiums may change as a result of the annual review.

- 2. KEPRO performs their level of care assessment, including requiring recent documentation from medical providers.
- 3. A medical review from the MRT is also required every few years. The frequency is determined on an individual basis and may be different depending on the child's diagnosis.

Step 6: Annual Review

The review for KEPRO is consistent with the initial assessment for Katie Beckett as it requires the same documents, but they must be updated yearly.

KEPRO mails a notice with a list of required documents to families approximately two months in advance of the annual review. This is to allow enough time to collect the documents.

KEPRO will also call one month before the reassessment is due to schedule the parent interview. Every third year, the interview must be done in person, otherwise it can take place over the phone.

When the reassessment occurs in person, your child is required to attend with you. However, if it occurs over the phone, only a parent or guardian needs to participate.

Helpful Tips



1. CHECK THE STATUS OF YOUR APPLICATION.

The application processes for MaineCare and Katie Beckett Programs are complex and involve several steps. It's very important to check on your application's status to best ensure it is moving through the proper channels.



2. TALK WITH YOUR CHILD'S MEDICAL PROVIDERS ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF USING THE CORRECT TERMINOLOGY AND MEDICAL LANGUAGE IN DOCUMENTS.

If the medical providers do not provide the necessary documents and terminology, your child may be denied benefits.

Helpful Tips



3. KEEP YOUR DOCUMENTS ORGANIZED.

Keep a binder or file folder with up-to-date documents from your child's providers so you are prepared for the annual reevaluation.

Keep a copy of every document you submit. Consider keeping electronic copies on your computer as well.

Keep a log of any conversations you have as well as all documents you mail, email, or fax to OFI and KEPRO.



4. DO NOT GET DISCOURAGED IF YOU RECEIVE A DENIAL LETTER.

First, determine if the denial letter is income related or disability related. If disability related, proceed with an appeal. You can do this by contacting OFI.



5. PAY YOUR PREMIUMS ON TIME.

If you are late with your payments, your MaineCare coverage may be promptly cancelled. While you can appeal this cancellation, you may be required to reapply and your child may have a lapse in coverage.
